PROFESSIONAL EXPERIENCE

2006-Present (Kuwait National Committee for Missing and POW Affairs)

Director of Operations: Responsible for the coordination of missions and operations in support of mass grave investigations. Analyze data and prepare site summaries for use in mass grave investigations. Meet with coalition forces and foreign embassies to carry out and organize our operations. Act as a liaison officer between coalition forces, international organizations (UN, ICRC) and Kuwait government in a matter related to POWs.

2004-2006 (Regime Crime Liaison Office – US Department of Justice)

Investigative Consultant: Assist the United States Government, Department of Justice in conjunction with Kuwait War Crime Office to research key documents to be used in court to file a criminal case against the former Iraqi regime. Evidence and material were gathered on the crimes against humanity, economic impact, and environmental devastation of the Iraqi invasion of Kuwait. Work with Regime Crime Liaison Office (RCLO) in support of the Iraqi High Tribunal in the investigation and prosecution of former Iraqi regime leadership for war crimes against Kuwait. Member of RCLO Mass Graves Operations Team in Baghdad, serving as a principal staff advisor in matters relating to Kuwait missing, POW, mass grave, exploitations, war crimes surveys, and assessments on compensation, cost of damage, concern the Kuwait environment case against Iraq including the oil burning of 1991. Help in the investigations and other critical information in conjunction with military Criminal Investigation Division, Federal Bureau of Investigation, and other investigative agencies. Support RCLO in developing prosecutorial packages used in building the case against Saddam Hussein and other former regime leaders suspected of committing atrocities.

2003-2004 (US Military Operation Enduring Freedom/Iraqi Freedom)

Liaison Officer to S-5, Civil – Military Affairs: Kuwait Augmentee to US Forces, served as linguist and liaison officer to US Forces. Responsibilities included coordinating with Kuwaiti Ministry of Interior and Ministry of Defense, during the major combat phase and the post-combat phase of Operation Iraqi Freedom. A key member of the 377th Theater Support Command's general staff, liaising with US forces and host nation relations, including but not limited to legal status for incoming personnel, and coordination for security escorts with Ministry of Interior. Assisted Coalition Forces at the request of the Kuwait National Committee for Missing and POWs under the authority of the Coalition Provisional Authority Office of Human Rights and the Interim Iraqi Government with the exploitation of mass graves uncovering several mass gravesites in Iraq and leading the recovery efforts of over 322 Kuwait Missing and POWs from the 1991 Gulf War.
